Washi papermaking

Ogawa washi has a history of over 1,300 years. Among its varieties, 'Hosokawa -Shi' was registered as a UNESCO Intangible Cultural Heritage papermaking technique in 2014. Visitors can observe the craftsmanship of washi making and even try making washi themselves.

Kumiko woodworking

Shoji screens, fusuma (sliding doors), and wooden doors are characteristic features of Japanese houses. These fittings are decorated with exquisite woodwork patterns called 'Kumiko.' Why not experience the spirit of the Japanese people by trying your hand at making Kumiko?
